- 8. False. Jurors are everyday citizens who come from the community. For example, you do not have to graduate from college or own a home to serve on a jury. The right to trial by jury is guaranteed in Article III of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights (namely, the Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh Amendments).
- 9. True. Jurors are fact finders and apply the facts to the law by answering questions in a document known as the "charge" or "instructions." This document is given to them by the trial judge.
- 10. True. Jury service is a way for citizens to participate directly in government, applying the law fairly in order to resolve disputes peacefully and protect their communities.
