When Texas Senior Corporal Trooper Jerome Ingle was helping his son and grandkids move back to Texas, he was hit by a commercial truck driver high on meth. The state trooper sustained serious injuries that impact his work to this day. He was lucky to escape with his life.

Others hit by intoxicated truck drivers are not so lucky.

305 In 2018, 305 truck drivers involved in fatal crashes tested positive for at least one drug.

Texas ranks first for the most large truck wrecks nationwide since 2016.
